

E. B. DEHART, 41, DIES SUDDENLY

**Prominent Citizen Passes
Nov. 4; Funeral Held
Saturday**

Ernest B. DeHart, 41, salesman for the Macon Furniture store, died in the Angel hospital at 5:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon, November 4, as a result of a stroke of apoplexy which he suffered Wednesday evening at 10 o'clock at his home.

Mr. DeHart worked all day Wednesday and attended prayer meeting that evening. He suffered the stroke following his return home from the meeting.

He was a member of the Franklin Baptist church; chairman of its finance committee, and a deacon. He also was associate director of the Baptist Training union and superintendent of the Macon county Sunday school association.

Mr. DeHart was active in Republican party circles in this county and district. For 10 years he was a clerk in the postoffice here and had been a substitute carrier since he gave up the clerkship.

Surviving are his widow, the former Miss Leona Hastings; one daughter, Helen; three sons, Turner, Doyle, and Kermit; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. L. DeHart; two brothers, Worley and Loren DeHart, and two sisters, Mrs. James Farmer and Mrs. Harley McConnell.
