MRS. HARRISON DIES SATURDAY

Franklin Woman Passes In Charleston, S. C.; Funeral Monday

Funeral services for Mrs. J. O. Harrison, wife of the chairman of the Macon county board of commissioners, were held Monday morning at 11 a. m. in the Franklin Methodist church. Mrs. Harrison died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Harry F. Jordan, in Charleston, S. C., shortly before 12 o'clock last Saturday night. She had been in Charleston several months, and had been seriously ill for the last several weeks.

Mrs. Harrison was born in Macon county Nov. 9, 1858, her maiden name being Allie Noland. On Oct. 31, 1883, she was married to J. O. Har-
