

# FARMER DIES OF APOPLEXY

**J. Caswell Higdon Stricken  
While Walking  
Near His Home**

Funeral services for J. Caswell Higdon, 48-year-old farmer of the Higdonville section who died of a stroke of apoplexy near his home last Thursday morning, were held Friday morning at 11 o'clock at the Sugar Fork Baptist church.

The Rev. B. W. Lefler, pastor of the Franklin Methodist circuit, officiated. Mill Shoal council, Junior Order of United American Mechanics, had charge of the service at the grave. Pallbearers were Wade Berry, Harley Stewart, Dude Berry, Fred Corbin and John Corbin.

Mr. Higdon had been visiting his aunt, Mrs. Harriet Higdon, two miles north of his home, and was returning when he suffered the stroke. He was about 300 yards from his home at the time. The body was discovered by a neighbor, Alfred Team.

Mr. Higdon lived with a brother, William, besides whom he is survived by four sisters, Mrs. W. H. Berry, Mrs. J. J. Corbin, Mrs. Charles Potts and Mrs. Lee Dills.
