

J. L. Higdon Dies Sunday At His Home

James (Jim) Leonard Higdon, 79, life long resident and member of one of Macon County's pioneer families, died early Sunday morning at his home in the Hogdonville community. His death came following a critical illness of four days. He had been in ill health for several years.

Widely known through out the county he served as a contractor, besides owning and operating a nice farm through a large part of his life. As a young man, he had also taught school.

In 1893 he married Miss Lavada Straine, who died five years ago.

He was a member and had served as a deacon of Sugarfork Baptist church.
