

J. A. MARTIN DIES IN S. C.

Father of Mrs. Ellard, of
Franklin, Buried At
Dillard

A sad occurrence was the death of James Andrew Martin, better known as Bud Martin, at his home in Simpsonville, S. C., on September 8.

For several months he had suffered intense pain from cancer and passed away to be relieved of all pain.

The deceased was sixty-eight years old and had lived the first forty-five years of his life as leading citizen of Tennessee Valley. His remains were laid to rest in the Baptist cemetery at Dillard beside that of his son, Albert, who passed away while their home was at Dillard.

Funeral services were conducted at the new Community church, this being the first funeral in the new church. The services were conducted by Rev. Sharpe, pastor of the Methodist church at Simpsonville, S. C., assisted by Revs. D. S. Patterson, E. E. Keen, Dr. A. J. Ritchie with Jones and McAfee undertakers.

Mr. Martin is survived by his widow, Mrs. Lillian Martin, three daughters, Mrs. Pearl Ellard, of Franklin, N. C.; Mrs. Sarah Bell Sims, of Fountain Inn, S. C., and Miss Margaret Martin, of Simpsonville, S. C., and five sons, Jack Martin, of Oklahoma; Henry Martin, of Simpsonville, S. C.; Bryan Martin, of Mountville, S. C.; F. D. and Hazel, of Simpsonville, S. C.; daughter, Mrs. Pierce Verden was laid to rest near Simpsonville two years ago and one son, Albert, was buried at Dillard before they moved to South Carolina.
