Clyde H. Pennington Dies Unexpectedly Here

Clyde Henderson Pennington, owner and operator of the Franklin Tire and Alignment Shop for the past 10 years, died unexpectedly Tuesday, March 5, at 4:30 a. m., at Angel Hospital.

The 46-year-old native of Lee County, Va., who moved to Macon County in 1925, had been suffering from a heart condition and was to have undergone corrective surgery later in the month. An employe for 15 years of Smoky Mountain Trailways before opening his Franklin business, Mr. Pennington was a member of the Junaluska Lodge No. 145, AF and AM, and the Franklin Rotary Club.

Funeral services were conducted yesterday (Wednesday) at 3 p.m. at the First Methodist Church by the Rev. R. R. Standley, the Rev. C. C. Welch, and the

Rev. Judd Duvall. Serving as active pallbearers were Frank Mathews, Bill Smart, Ernest Hyde, Charlie Davidson, Harry Robinson, C. E. Henry, and Harry Kinsland.

Born Sept. 14, 1916, Mr. Pennington was the son of the late Nathan and Mrs. Ina Kinsland Pennington. He was married Aug. 31, 1941, in Clayton, Ga., to Miss Mary Katherine Hall, of Jackson County, who survives. He was a member of the Oak Grove Baptist Church.
